Role of Mentor is Beyond the role of Teacher, Coach, Trainer, or Counselor. Out of all the roles, the role of The Mentor is most challenging and much needed by students throughout their school, college and even working life. Out of the above-mentioned roles, mentoring is one the most personal because of the one-on-one relationship, low turnover rate, and the situation. A teacher's job is to successfully pass on knowledge to their pupils to prepare them for their future. The measurement of success is how well the student performs academically, and equal responsibility for that success is shared between both parties. When it comes to student and teacher relationships, most teachers are responsible for dozens to hundreds of students, making it difficult to obtain a close and personal relationship. A mentor helps their mentee in all aspects: academically, personally, socially, and psychologically. In a way, mentoring has elements of teaching, coaching, training, and counseling.

Mentoring is the personal and professional relationship between the two people, with one instilling guidance and knowledge upon the other. A person doesn't have to have a degree or be an expert in order to be a mentor. Once a month a meeting is done with parents also to update them with this ward's progress in academics, extracurricular activities, personality, and conduct observation, etc. Time to time DME invites Parents as well as alumni as guest speakers for experience sharing with the students. This also helps to have the positive involvement of parents in the grooming of students.

Mentoring is a continuous process at DME until the end of the academic career of the student. During the last semester of study, students are advised for higher studies along with proper career guidance. Reasonable numbers of students have secured admissions for their higher studies and they, in turn, guide their juniors for their prospective admissions or job interviews. at DME, Mentors guide students whenever they are faced with new phases of their start of college life, career, or life that require the development of new knowledge, skills, or attitudes. The name of DME Mentoring Cell is THRIVE. The whole structure is in place to ensure that DME students don't just survive in life but they thrive and prosper in academics, career, and personal life.

Mentoring Experience

The mentoring cell was formed at DME with a view to mentor the students across all the three schools. The cell is headed by Dr. Poorva Ranjan, Professor, DME Management School. As a part of this cell, regular weekly mentoring sessions were taken by the mentors with their respective mentees. The mentoring session in the Management School used to be held on Thursdays, the duration of which was half an hour. To start with, the orientation week was held for the first year students of Management School during August, 2019. It involved the interaction of Head and various committee convenors with the

Various activities were conducted by myself with my mentees (BBA, Batch 2017-20, Section-A) as a part of mentoring cell. To start with, a Parent Mentor Meet (PMM) was held on 7th September 2019 wherein the agenda was to convey student's academic performance to his parents along with inputs on his/behaviour, his overall events and activities participation, etc. Advice was also given to the parents for the betterment of students. A 2nd PMM of Academic Year 2019-20, on 5th October 2019.

Other activity that was conducted included explanation of DME Ethos to the students. The purpose of this was to stress upon the importance of ethics in our lives. Since I was a mentor of final year in the previous academic session, the other mentoring sessions focussed upon conduction of the SWOT analysis of the students by themselves. The purpose of conducting the SWOT analysis was the identification of strengths by each student so that he/she can further build upon them while applying for job interviews. Another session involved apprising students about the 'Interview Dressing Etiquette'. Since the students were to appear for their job interviews, this session was very perfect for the occasion. Other mentoring sessions included quizzes, team building activity, etc.

Overall, through these sessions, the purpose of the mentoring cell which was to encourage interaction of the mentees with their mentors was served well.

- Third position: Saransh Gupta 2 Year Section B2

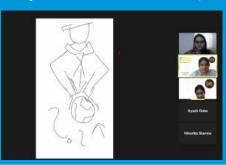

The workshop received an overwhelming response and was attended by 121 participants, consisting of faculty members and research scholars from reputed universities across the length and breadth of India. There were a few international participants also. Ms. Shanu Jain, Workshop in charge opened the session and welcomed the keynote speaker and trainer for the session. Dr.Isha Jaswal, Head, Research Cell addressed the audience and welcomed the guest. 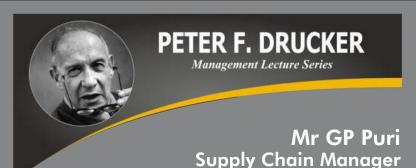

On 9th September 2020, DME Management School organized a Guest Lecture for Management students as a part of its Peter F. Drucker Management Lecture Series. Mr. G.P. Puri, Supply Chain/Procurement Transformation Manager, Bahrain Petroleum Company, Bahrain was the esteemed guest for the lecture. The session was hosted by Dr. Sudhir Bisht & Mr. Bhupender Singh. The topic for the session was, "A Bird's Eye View on the World's Petroleum Industry".

The session started with welcoming the Guest Speaker by Dr. Sudhir Bisht. Mr. Puri is a Graduate and MBA from Delhi University, he topped MBA in "Supply Chain Management" from Arizona State University, United States. Before joining Bahrain Petroleum Company, he also headed Supply Chain/Logistics/Operations at Exxon Mobil, Castrol, Oriflame, Chevron Corporation (US). He is a Senior Supply Chain Leader with proven track record of operational delivery, supply chain transformation and organizational capability

development. He is recognized for his leadership and experience in developing supply chain strategy, leading transformation projects and managing integrated supply chains.

During the lecture, Mr. Puri introduced the Petroleum Industry and enlightened the students about how petroleum industry manages all the supply chain. He elaborated on How oil is formed, about natural occurrences of petroleum, why is oil called black gold, how much oil and gas do we need, how much energy do we need, how does the pricing works in domestic as well as international market, He also elaborated on career in petroleum industry. He emphasized on how managing demand $\mathcal B$ supply of oil, gas and energy sources is critical for efficient use of energy sources. He also elaborated how supply chain, value chain and distribution channel management is critically important while the world needs more energy resources as its population grows and as countries become more economically prosperous.

The session was captivating and students posed several pertinent questions with related to petroleum industry offerings, techniques used at oil companies, segregation of petroleum products from raw occurrences. Towards the end of the session, Mr. Puri also addressed students as hot commodity in the oil and gas industry, adding that many companies have developed elaborated internship programs. He also discussed various supply chain positions in the oil and gas industry. The lecture was extremely enriching as it enhanced students' knowledge about advancements in the petroleum industry and also encouraged students for career opportunities in the industry.

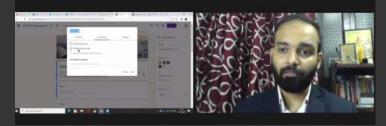
"Creating and Using Google Forms for Conducting Research Work"

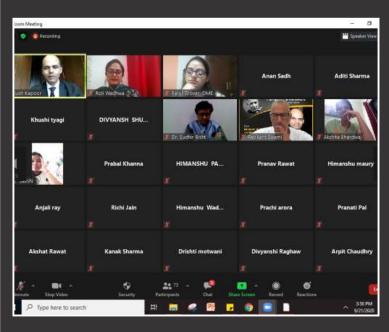
